

## BAB 7

### KESIMPULAN DAN SARAN

Bab ini berisi kesimpulan yang merupakan jawaban dari tujuan penelitian dan saran untuk pengembangan penelitian ini.

#### 7.1. Kesimpulan

- a. Hasil identifikasi dan pengelompokan komplain adalah sebagai berikut: *Outerbag* (4 komplain); *Contamination* (4 komplain); *Spec* (3 komplain); *Film* (3 komplain), *Carton* (2 komplain); *Bag* (2 komplain), *Seal* (2 komplain), *Handle* (1 komplain), *Print* (1 komplain), *Container* (1 komplain); dan *Cut* (0 komplain).
- b. Program dapat dikembangkan dengan melengkapi program dengan fitur ekspor ke *Microsoft Excel* sehingga pengelolaan komplain dapat lebih menghemat waktu pengelolaan komplain dan mempermudah pengelolaan komplain.
- c. Proses pengelolaan komplain menggunakan *text mining* lebih efisien dibandingkan proses pengelolaan komplain saat ini karena lebih mudah dan memerlukan waktu lebih singkat dari proses pengelolaan komplain sebelum menggunakan *text mining*.
- d. Proses pengelolaan komplain menggunakan *text mining* sudah efektif karena menghasilkan hasil yang sesuai dengan kenyataan.

#### 7.2. Saran

- a. Program sebaiknya dilengkapi program dengan fitur ekspor ke *Microsoft Excel* sehingga pengelolaan komplain dapat lebih efisien.
- b. Program sebaiknya dapat dilengkapi dengan fitur untuk mengartikan singkatan sehingga kata kunci dari *e-mail* yang disingkat tetap dapat dideteksi.
- c. Program sebaiknya dapat mendeteksi masalah yang diungkapkan menggunakan *adverb*.

- Ivana : Selamat pagi pak Semi, saya mau bertanya lebih lanjut tentang pengelolaan komplain di perusahaan ini Pak.

- Pak Semi : Iya bener mbak, jadi yang pertama itu Pak Budi terima *e-mail* dari konsumen, kalau *nggak* Pak Budi ya Pak Yan yang terima, nanti kalau ada *e-mail* masuk, nanti mereka yang kasih ke saya mbak, terus saya cetak.
- Ivana : Kalau *e-mail* sudah dicetak, yang Bapak lakukan selanjutnya apa Pak?
